



## **Ideas for Puzzle (Sight) Word Cards**

### **FLASHCARDS:**

See how many sight words your child can recognize! Use sight word flashcards to help your child become familiar with common words that they will encounter frequently in reading. Hold up a card and ask your child to read the word aloud, or you can say the word, and they repeat it. To make it more fun, you can also ask your child to act out the word or use it in a sentence.

### **THE "BRING-ME" GAME:**

Lay out a selection of sight word cards, then ask your child to bring you specific words. For example, "Can you bring me the word 'the'?" or "Please bring me the word 'and.'" This game reinforces sight word recognition and helps your child practice retrieving words quickly.

### **CONCENTRATION (MEMORY MATCHING):**

Using two sets of sight word cards (start with a few words), place all the cards face down. One player turns over two cards; if they match (e.g., two cards with the word "the"), they keep the pair. If not, they flip the cards back over, and it's the next player's turn. The player with the most matching pairs at the end of the game wins. This game helps children improve their memory and recognition of sight words.

### **WRITING SIGHT WORDS:**

Invite your child to practice writing sight words on paper. You can start by having them copy the words or write them from memory. Use different writing utensils (crayons, markers, or colored pencils) to keep it interesting. You can also encourage your child to write the words in different sizes or colors, adding a playful twist to the activity.

### **SIGHT WORD WRITING FROM A DISTANCE:**

For a fun twist on writing, hold up a sight word card so your child can see it for just a few seconds. After they've had a "sneak peek," ask them to walk across the room and write the word on a piece of paper. This game helps reinforce sight word recognition while adding a physical activity component. It also encourages memory recall and boosts confidence as they try to remember the word from a short viewing period.

### **SIGHT WORD SENTENCES:**

Once your child has learned a few sight words, you can use them to create simple sentences. Write out a sentence on a whiteboard or a piece of paper, leaving some of the sight words blank. For example, "I can \_\_\_\_\_," and ask your child to fill in the blank with the correct word. This activity encourages your child to recognize sight words in context and reinforces their meaning.

### **SIGHT WORD BINGO:**

Create a bingo board with a mix of sight words. Call out a word, and have your child cover the corresponding word on their bingo card. You can adjust the difficulty level by using more or fewer words, depending on your child's progress. This is a fun, game-based way to reinforce sight word recognition.

### **SIGHT WORD STORIES:**

Create simple stories or short phrases using your child's sight words. As you read together, encourage your child to point to the sight words as they come across them. You can also read books together and look for sight words in the text.
